Fifth Sunday of Easter

Acts 6: 1-7

John 14: 1-12

The first reading from the Acts shows us the early Church as a loving, serving, and worshipping community. Hence, it easily solved a problem of discrimination as the Greek speaking widows were being overlooked in the daily distribution of food. The apostles responded by choosing seven men and so in effect instituting the diaconate for the service of the community. The seven were filled with the Holy Spirit and were successful in resolving the issue.

1 Peter 2: 4-9

In the second reading, St. Peter advises the early Christians to renew the memory of Jesus by making their community a spiritual edifice built from the "living stones" of believers upon the "living cornerstone of Christ". For unbelievers, the stone rejected by the builders has proved to be the keystone, a stone to stumble over, a rock to bring them down, is the fate in store for them. Peter praises Christians, both Gentile and Jewish, as "a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, and God's own people". Believers should come to Christ to offer spiritual sacrifices to God through Him. Disciples have been called out of darkness into God's marvellous light. In the Gospel, Jesus consoles his apostles (who are sad and disheartened at His announcement that He will be leaving them soon), by assuring them that he is going to prepare an everlasting accommodation for them in his Father's House in Heaven. He gives them the assurance that he will come back to take them to their Heavenly abodes. It is then that Thomas says, "Lord, we do not know where you are going; how can we know the way?" Jesus answers Thomas' question with, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life; no one comes to the Father, but by me". He also tells them that those who believe in Him will do greater work than He has done and promises to send them the Holy Spirit to guide them. Malcolm.

Joined the hermits in the ruins of Monte Cassino monastery in Italy between Rome and Naples. Elected the superior of monks. Rebuilt the monastery which Benedict had founded. Pope Gregory II gave him an autographed copy of <i>Rule of St Benedict</i> . Known as <i>Second founder of the Benedictine monastery of Monte Cassino</i> . Attracted many notable monks.

6.30pm Mass Thanksgiving Mass for 10 th birthday of Tia Tomy 10 am Mass Thanksgiving Mass	Monday 8 th May St Magdalen of Canossa Born in 1774 in Italy to Marquis in Canossa Palace. Three siblings died young. Father died when she was 5 years old. Mother abandoned her and two sisters and brother. Uncle and aunt brought her up. At 18 ran the large estate at Canossa Palace. After French invasion realised help was needed for wounded, poor and sick. Also needed to improve morals and Christian practice. Indentified young girls as most vulnerable. Left Palace to an abandoned Convent with many others to start a refuge and schools for poor girls or those in trouble. Founded Order of <i>Daughters of Charity</i> better known as <i>Canossian Sisters of Charity</i> . Sent nuns to hospitals to care for sick. Order spread throughout world. Died 1835. Tuesday 9 th St Pachomius the Great Born in 292 in Egypt into a wealthy pagan family. Was forced into the Roman army. Galley slave on the River Nile. Met Christians in port who gave help to the troops. Became a Christian. 7 years a hermit with Paloemom who taught him building skills.				
for Elsa Joy Day of Prayer for Victims of Abuse	Unlike the hermits of St Antony of Egypt his monks lived in community in large settlements. Developed the first real monasteries with a strict <i>Rule</i> which defined monastic life. When he died in 348 aged 56 there were 9 monasteries for men and 2 for women. His <i>Rule</i> influenced St Benedict in the West and St Basil in the East and later St Hilary of Arles.				
	Wednesday 10 th St John of Avila Born in 1499 in Spain to wealthy and pious parents. Sent to study law but changed to philosophy and theology. Both parents died. Ordained a priest. First Mass at the church where his parents were buried. Always wanted to be a missionary to Mexico. Archbishop of Seville asked him to be a missionary in Spain in land recently regained from the Moors. Very successful preacher. Attracted large crowds and many converts. Criticised the rich and powerful which caused him to be imprisoned and tried by the Spanish Inquisition for a year. Acquitted to the
