Romans 8: 26-27 **Page 105** Wisdom 12: 13, 16-19 Matthew 13: 24-43 Today's readings tell us about a very patient and compassionate God Who is hopeful that the so-called "weeds" among us will be converted. They warn us that we should not be in a hurry to eliminate such elements from the Church or society or the family based on unwarranted and hasty judgment. The first reading from the Book of Wisdom shows us a merciful and patient God, rather than the disciplining and punishing God presented in the book of Genesis. The second reading, taken from Paul's letter to the Romans, reminds us that the Spirit of God constantly empowers us in our prayers and in our weakness. So, we should be patient with ourselves and with others. Finally, in the Gospel parable of the wheat and the weeds. Jesus presents a wise and patient God who allows the good and the evil to coexist in the world until the harvest, and blesses the evil ones for the little good they may have done, so that they may come to conversion before their time ends: "Let the wheat and the weeds [darnel] grow together till the harvest time." In other words, God is "delaying" the end of the world for repentant sinners, giving them more time, and offering them the graces of strength and good will so that they may get reconciled with Him. God calmly recognizes that there is evil in the world, but He sees that evil is no excuse for the good people not to do good with the power of God at their disposal. Through the parable of the wheat and the weeds in today's Gospel, Jesus calls us to be patient with those who seem to us to fail to meet the high ethical standard expected of a Christian.

6pm: Confessions 6.30pm Vigil Mass Hazel McMahon RIP 8 th anniversary	Saturday 22 nd St Mary Magdalene Born in small village of Magdala on western shore of Sea of Galilee, prosperous fishing boat building and trading centre. Mary was relatively wealthy but had a chronic psychological difficulty that Jesus cured. Devoted disciple of Jesus. No evidence of her being a prostitute. This notion goes back to sexist Pope Gregory the Great who identified her incorrectly with the woman who washed the feet of Jesus with her hair. Only the Western Church had this incorrect image. Eastern Church considers her an important disciple, one of the three Marys, with Mary of Bethany and the Virgin Mary. She was at the crucifixion, the burial and the first words of the risen Christ were to her. She was considered the "Apostle to the apostles".

6.30pm Mass	Monday 24 th St Charbel Makhluf Born in 1828 in Lebanon to poor family, youngest of five children. Lived high in Lebanese mountains. His father, a mule driver, died after forced labour with the Turkish army when he was 3 years old. His mother married a man who became the parish priest. Youssef looked after family animals. Built a grotto to the Virgin Mary. Mother wanted him to marry. Followed example of his uncles and joined a monastery. Took the name Brother Charbel. Studied philosophy and theology. Ordained a priest. Fr Charbel then spent 16 years at St Maron Monastery where he lived a holy, austere life devoted to prayer, contemplation and manual work. Had ability to unite Christians and Muslims. Allowed to live as a hermit. Over next 23 years gained reputation for holiness and wisdom and developed a respect and cooperation between Christians and Muslims. Died at age 70. There was a miraculous improvement in the weather at his funeral. Tuesday 25 th St James the Great Son of Zebedee and Salome. His father was a fisherman on

With the birth of Mary, Anne began a new life, watching her every movement with reverent tenderness. Mary was presented in the Temple aged 3					

Friesland one of 6 children. 3 became nuns and 2 priests including Anno. Joined Carmelites and took the name Titus. Ordained in 1905 aged 24. Started a journal of Marian devotion and a Catholic newspaper. Founded Catholic Secondary School. Professor of philosophy at Catholic University of Nijmegan in the Netherlands in 1923. Wonderful sense of humour. Always had time for students. Travelled Europe and USA speaking on Carmelite mysticism and Christian unity. Chaplain to Catholic journalists. In 1935 opposed Hitler in the press and in lectures. Drew up plans to evacuate Dutch Jews to Carmelite missions in Brazil. Strongly opposed Nazis after invasion of Holland in 1940. In 1941 Jewish students forbidden to attend Catholic schools. Fr Titus, as President of Association of Catholic Schools, condemned policy in press and in sermons. Also opposed the policy that Catholic papers must publish Nazis propaganda. Arrested in 1942 and told to retire to a monastery but he refused. Martyred in Dachau concentration camp on 26th July 1942. Friday 28th St Samson of Dol Born 485 in South Wales to elderly noble parents. Educated by St Illtyd, abbot of monastery in South Wales. Proved to be academic, virtuous and austere as a monk. Ordained deacon and priest. Moved to another monastery on Caldey Island. Abbot Pyr then fell down a well drunk and died. Samson became abbot and reformed monastic life. Accompanied visiting Irish monks to Ireland. Back in Wales sent his uncle to be superior of monastery in Ireland that had asked for help. Samson retired as abbot and with his father and 2 other monks became hermits. Then made to be abbot of monastery and a bishop. Travelled ensuring orthodox monastic practices in Cornwall, Scilly Islands, Guernsey and finally Normandy as well as founding new monasteries, one at Dol where he stayed. Appointed Bishop of Dol. Attended Council of Paris. Saturday 29th St Martha of Bethany The dominant and active sister compared to Mary of Bethany who was the quiet contemplative sister. Sister of Lazarus.
