Page 140 Isaiah 25: 6-10Philippians 4: 12-14, 19-20 Matthew 22: 1-14

The readings this weekend follows on from last weekend's metaphor of the Jews rejecting Jesus and his invitation to live His message and consequently God inviting the Gentiles to have a chance of reaching heaven. In Matthew's gospel's perplexing parable of the wedding feast, the seemingly exaggerated reactions of the king emphasises intent to jolt its audience into recognising the magnitude of the divine invitation they received. While God's grace is freely given, there's an expectation for believers to develop and live a spiritual and morally aligned life, much like being dressed properly for the wedding feast or divine feast of heaven and not being cast out like the guest in the parable. In the first reading the prophet Isaiah has a similar idea of a feast as he refers to a banquet of rich food provided on God's holy mountain, Mount Zion. He paints a picture of God's benevolence and commitment to his people. He prophesises a time when God will prepare a feast for all people, wipe away tears, and remove the disgrace of His people from the earth. This vision is not just about a distant future but serves as a reminder of God's continuous promise of care and salvation in heaven. In the second reading St Paul is writing to the Philippians while being imprisoned in Ephesus and thanks them for their support and gifts. "It was good of you to share with me your hardships. In return my God will fulfil all your needs". He refers to his life when he was rich and when he suffered poverty and how there was nothing he could not "master with the help of the One who gives me strength". In the Psalm we accept the Lord as our shepherd, guiding us on the right paths, not for our pride, ego or recognition, but for His name's sake. Then only goodness and kindness follow us, by flowing from our actions and attitudes. The Lord strengthen us, we do not strengthen ourselves, as God gives us courage and fully supplies what we need for salvation. We have to respond by following the guidance that Jesus has given us. Put in charge of the Christian cemetery on Appian Way. Very good at the job and gained prestige for his meticulous work. Still called the <i>Catacombs of St Callistus</i> . Became advisor to Pope Zephyrinus. He was the natural successor. Made Bishop of Rome in 218. Liberal Pope who always forgave sinners and heretics. Allowed marriage between Romans citizens and slaves. Opposed by Roman antipope Hippolytus who held that certain sins were too serious to be forgiven. Pope Callistus was charming and a very likeable person. Preferred resolving disputes than causing conflict. Murdered by a pagan uprising and died a martyr in 222,

6.30pm Mass	Monday 16th St Margaret Mary Alacoque Born in 1647 in Burgandy, France. Father died when she was 8. From childhood had a devotion to the Blessed Sacrament and was attracted to life of a nun. Preferred prayer to play. In secret she practiced severe mortification. Had visions of Christ. Received Confirmation and added name Mary. Aged 24 joined the Visitation Convent Experienced visions of the Passion of Christ, Then received "private revelations" about the devotion to the <i>Sacred Heart of Jesus</i> over 18 months. Included Communion on 1 st Friday of the month, <i>Holy Hour</i> adoration of the Eucharist on Thursdays and the need for a feast day. Her Convent observed the devotion and a feast day from 1686. Jesuits encouraged the devotion in their many communities. Sister Margaret Mary Alacoque died on 17 th October 1690. Devotion of the <i>Sacred Heart of Jesus</i> was recognised in Poland in 1765 and universally in the Church in 1856.

Mariyam Cheriya RIP 1 st Anniversary	present day Turkey, part of the Eastern Roman Empire. Converted with friend Polycarp by John the Evangelist. Third Bishop of Antioch. St Peter had been the first Bishop of Antioch. Early Christian writer and skilled in pastoral care. He inspired hope and strength against persecution by Roman Emperor Domitian. Period of peace for Christians until new Emperor Trajan demanded pagan								

	worship. Ignatius refused to obey. Arrested, slowly taken to Rome so he could preach and send 6								
	letters to churches on his route Entered Rome in 108. Martyred in Roman Coliseum killed by lions.

He wrote in Greek for the non-Jewish community. Brilliant storyteller. He obtained a lot of his information from Mary or the other women who followed Jesus. Wrote about them more than the other 3 evangelists. In the <i>Acts</i> he used "we" in three sections as he was involved and was with Paul to the end. In his <i>Gospel</i> on the ministry of Jesus he stresses concern for the weakest, the action of the Holy Spirit,

Porch Closed	Saturday 21st St Philip Howard Born in 1557 in London, eldest son of Thomas Howard, 4 th Duke of Norfolk. Baptised a Catholic by his Catholic parents but educated a Protestant after Queen Elizabeth came to the throne a year after his birth. John Knox, founder of the Church of Scotland, was his teacher from the age of 7 in London. His father appeared to accept Queen Elizabeth and the new religion but was involved in a plot to marry the Catholic Mary, Queen of Scots, depose								
	Elizabeth and restore Catholicism. The plot was discovered; Thomas Howard was tried, found guilty and executed in 1572. Philip was only 15 years of age so did not share the blame. He was sent to Cambridge University where the teaching was firmly Protestant. Had a frivolous life which continued in the royal court where he became a favourite of Queen Elizabeth who allowed him to inherit his maternal grandfather's title as 13 th Earl of Arundel but not his father's title as 5 th Duke of Norfolk. As a secret Catholic, his wife Anne had a good influence on him and raised Philip's interest in religion. After hearing debates by Catholic priests Philip became a Catholic. The now devoted couple decided to leave England. Philip left a letter for Queen Elizabeth. Couple captured before departure
