Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe Sunday 26<sup>th</sup> November 2023

**Page 158** Ezekiel 34: 11-12, 15-17 1 Corinthians 15: 20-26, 28 Matthew 25: 31-46 This weekend is the last of the liturgical year and celebrates the Kingship of Jesus Christ before we enter Advent next weekend. The readings give very different pictures of God and Jesus. In the first reading and the Psalm the image of God is one of a shepherd who cares for his sheep, looks for the lost sheep, heals the wounded and makes the weak strong. This picture is one well understood by the Jews of the time where sheep would graze on the arid hills of Palestine wandering far in the search of the best grass. Sheep from different shepherds would be mixed up on the same hillside so shepherds would have to go in search of their own sheep, some who may have been injured or become weak. This is the concept of Christ the King, emphasising qualities of compassionate leadership and care, the qualities of a shepherd. In contrast, in the second reading, St Paul writes to the Corinthians in Greece with a picture of God who is tough judge rather than a kind master. Christ has risen, so initiating resurrection for everyone, "all men will be brought to life in Christ". But before handing over the kingdom to God he must be a king who needs to put all his enemies under his feet and the last of the enemies to be destroyed" then everything will be subjected to God. This is a God who emphasises his power, sovereignty and authority but is offering a new life in Christ to those who deserve it they live and act in the right way. The Gospel from Matthew, that we have been following since Easter, ends appropriately with Jesus telling his disciples about the final judgement of the Nations where people will be separated like sheep and goats depending on how they served him. We have the tough judge again where some people will inherit eternal life and others will face eternal punishment. The really important message from Jesus is the criteria that are used for making the judgement. It is whether they have recognised Christ in people who are in need; feeding the hungry, giving drink to the thirsty, welcoming strangers, clothing the naked, looking after the sick and visiting prisoners. A very strong message of Catholic Social Teaching, so relevant today with our treatment of the weak and vulnerable in whom we should recognise Christ. Malcolm

Intelligent and beautiful daughter of governor of Alexandria. Was a convert who challenged the pagan Roman Emperor Maxentius and converted some of his best pagan philosophers and his wife. Maxentius was furious and executed the converts. Tried to kill Catherine tied to a wheel with blazing torches. Failed as the ropes broke and the wheel fell apart. Then martyred by the sword.							
9.30 am Mass	Sunday 26 <sup>th</sup> November Our Lord Jesus Christ the King Jean Sinpore RIP							
6.30pm Mass	<b>Monday 27<sup>th</sup> St James Intercisus</b> Born Persia about 390. Christian who renounced his faith as a military officer to gain privilege from the king. When king died his family put pressure on him resume his Christianity which he did. Admitted he was a Christian to the new king and sentenced to death. He died as a martyr being slowly cut into 28 pieces and finally beheaded in about 421.							
10 am Mass Thanksgiving Mass for Mr and Mrs Peter	<b>Tuesday 28<sup>th</sup> St Catherine Laboure</b> Born 1806 in France. Her father was a well educated and fairly rich farmer. Her mother died when she was 9 years old and she went to live with her aunt. Catherine kissed a statue of the Virgin Mother and said "Now you will be my mother". In her teens she worked as a waitress in her uncle's café in Paris. She was very devout and had a dream where a sick priest said "it is good to look after the sick". Later in a hospice run by the <i>Daughters of Charity</i> she saw a picture of St Vincent de Paul, their founder, and recognised him as the priest in her dream. She joined the Order in 1830 aged 24. She had a vision of the heart of St Vincent de Paul above his relics that had been brought to the convent. Each novice was given a piece of cloth from his surplice. She prayed to him that she would have a vision of the Virgin Mary, her new mother. She then had visions of Our Lady who relayed the request for people to wear the famous <i>Miraculous Medal of Our Lady of Graces</i> . Catherine spent 40 years caring for the aged and infirm and promoting the devotion. She died in 1876 aged 70. Her body is now encased in glass in the <i>Chapel of the Apparition</i> in Paris. Canonised in 1947 by Pope Pius XII. Medal not so popular now.							
6.30 pm Mass	Wednesday 29 <sup>th</sup> St Cuthbert Mayne. Born 1543 in Devon. Ordained a priest in the Church of England. Attended Oxford University and met Edmund Campion who was still a Protestant and others who were interested in Catholicism. Converted and escaped arrest and went to study in France in 1573. Ordained a priest at English College in Douai. Returned as part of the English mission to Cornwall in 1576. Posed as a steward to rich Catholic landowner and ministered to the recusant Catholics. Eventually arrested in 1577 and executed at Lauceston in Cornwall. First priest trained in English College at Douai in France and martyred in England.

Family house in Capharnaum where Jesus often stayed. He was close to Jesus and told him about the boy with the loaves and fishes before the miracle feeding. One of the four who went with Jesus to Mount of Olives. Travelled widely in his preaching from Iran through to the Black Sea to Greece via Constantinople. Martyred in Patras, Greece. Crucified on X shaped "saltire" cross as he felt he was not worthy to die like the death of Jesus. St Andrew's Cross, the white cross of Scotland, is part of the Union Jack.							
NO MASS	Brought up a Catholicism. We at Douai in Fran Jesuit priests se He wrote the Caministered in Bo	Friday 1 <sup>st</sup> December St Edmund Campion. Born 1540 in London, son of a bookseller. Brought up a Catholic. Went to Oxford University and became Anglican deacon. Returned to Catholicism. Went to Ireland and helped establish University of Dublin. Then to the English College at Douai in France to study for priesthood. Ordained in 1578. With Fr Robert Parsons, the first two Jesuit priests sent on English mission. Arrived in London in the guise of a jewel merchant in 1580. He wrote the <i>Campion's Brag</i> to justify his return to England. Had to leave London for safety. Then ministered in Berkshire, Oxfordshire, Northamptonshire and Lancashire Eventually arrested, faced trail, found guilty and martyred at Tyburn with two other priests on 1 <sup>st</sup> December 1581.
