Page 129Jonah 3: 1-5, 101 Corinthians 7: 29-31Mark 1: 14-20.The Christmas Season has ended and the Season of Lent is still some weeks off. We are once again in "Ordinary Time",
as it's called, and the focus of the Scripture readings this weekend is on God's call and the choice we humans have to
heed that call or ignore it. It is always clear in Scripture that we are never forced by God, but lovingly invited to take up the
invitation to be a follower of the Lord and to give ourselves to a life of love and service of God and our neighbour,
especially those who are the most vulnerable and voiceless.

In the first reading from the Book of Jonah, written a few centuries before the birth of Christ, the minor prophet Jonah initially is reluctant to obey God's call to go to the people in Nineveh, the capital city of Assyria. The Assyrians were enemies of the Israelites and the dominant "superpower" of the time and their empire in some ways was the first imperial power. Consider the enormity of the task of preaching repentance to a triumphant people who attributed their success to anything but the God of Israel. Jonah gives himself tirelessly to the task of convincing the people of Nineveh of the need for rejecting sin and turning to God. They had 40 days to change their ways otherwise disaster would strike their city. Ultimately, the people heed the call of Jonah by turning from bad behaviour to God with sincere hearts and penance. In the second reading St Paul emphasises to his friends the Corinthians in Greece on the fleeting nature of earthly experiences and the importance of focusing on eternal truths. However the way he presents it is very strange and extreme but not unusual for Paul. If everyone became celibate, giving up their wives, the Church would cease to exist. Mark's gospel was probably the earliest to be written and was aimed mainly for a Roman Gentile audience. It takes up the theme of calling people to follow the teachings of Christ as, after John's arrest, Jesus calls the two fishermen Simon and Andrew to be "fishers of men". Then He recruits the brothers James and John who leave their father Zebedee to be his disciples. Are we willing to be true followers of Jesus Christ? Malcolm.

Priest with doctorates in philosophy and theology. He taught in University in Rome. Lifelong habit of giving his clothes away to the poor. Organised vocational schools for different trades. A bubbly and friendly person who endeared himself to people. An inspirational and popular preacher who was keen on social work and pastoral care particularly for the poor. Founded the <i>Society of the Catholic Apostolate for</i> clergy and laity to renew the apostolic spirit in the Church. Also known as the <i>Pious Union.</i> For the care of orphaned girls he founded <i>Pallottine Missionary Sisters</i> . Appointed the chaplain to the prison in Rome. Ministered to them and tried to change their conditions especially those facing death penalty. Close friends with the future Cardinal Wiseman of England. Encouraged him to start a College for foreign missions. Later Mill Hill Missions founded. Met John Henry Newman in Rome but John did not join the <i>Pious Union</i> . Vincent kept in contact with John as he founded the Oratory in Birmingham. His <i>Pious Union</i> for priests and laity was the foundation of <i>Catholic Action</i> in the Church. His writings and projects were studied at the <i>Second Vatican Council</i> . | | | | | | | | |
| 10 am Mass | Tuesday 23rd St John the Almsgiver Born about 558 in Cyprus. Son of the governor of Cyprus. Also known as John the Merciful. Wife and children died. Became monk in Alexandria, Egypt. Gained a reputation for helping the poor. Elected Patriarch of Alexandria. He distributed the gold in his church treasury among the hospitals and monasteries in the area. He was a reformer. Improved religious education to fight heresy, stopped the selling of ecclesiastical privileges and demanded fair financial dealings. Built churches. Twice a week gave alms to the poor and settled disputes. Visited houses of the sick and hospitals. Many examples of his judgement, wisdom and generosity. Led an austere life style. Freed slaves. | | Wednesday 24 th St Francis de Sales Born in 1567. His father was Lord of Sales de Boisy First his six sons, his father gave him a privileged education for a career as a magistrate. At age 14 he went to F University to study with the Jesuits. To please his father he took lessons in gentlemanly pursuits of ric dancing and fencing but did not enjoy them. He became interested in a spiritual life and added theology to studies Worried by his gentle nature, his father suggested a military career to toughen him up before taking his legal profession. Rejected a military life but promised his elderly father he would finish his study of lar Padua University in Italy. When he returned home again Francis told his father he was furious. We December 1622 | ordained in 1593 and became the Provost of the Cathedral Chapter for the Bishop of Geneva based in Annecy in France due Calvinists control in Switzerland. He was a confident speaker and able theologian. Sermons were quite short, to the point, delivered slowly and gently, inspiring many with their wisdom. In great demand as a confessor. Appointed Coadjutor Bishop of Geneva in 1599 by Pope Clement VIII. Sent on diplomatic mission to King Henry of France in Paris. Made Bishop of Geneva based in Annecy in France. Reformed the diocese by preaching, education of clergy, careful personal vetting of candidates for the spiritual life and the writing of many letters. With Jeanne de Chantel, who moved to Annecy in 1610, founded the <i>Order of the Visitation of the Blessed Virgin</i> for young girls and widows who had not the strength, or lacked the inclination, for the corporal austerities of the great major Orders. Criticised as a bishop for being too gentle with heretics and sinners. Went back to Paris in 1618 and met Vincent de Paul. Frances de Sales died at Lyon on 28 th December 1622 on a return journey from Avignon. Called "Gentleman Saint" due to noble birth and gentleness. | | | | | | | |
