Romans 8: 31-34 Genesis 22: 1-2, 9-13, 15-18 Mark 9: 2-10 Page 155 Readings this weekend feature two mountain top events, on Mount Moriah and Mount Tabor. In our lives we experience "mountain top events" of great joy or deep sadness, for which we offer our thanks and gratitude to Our Lord or severely tests our faith in God. It takes strength to cope with the ups and downs of life and our prayers and religious reading can help us to cope. It reminds me of the quote from Rudyard Kipling's popular poem which is at the player's entrance at the Centre Court of Wimbledon: "If you can meet with Triumph and Disaster and treat those two imposters just the same" In the first reading Abraham's faith and obedience is severely tested when God asks him to offer his only son Isaac as a burnt offering on the mountain. It is all the more poignant as Abraham and Sarah had been childless for so long before Isaac was born. When Abraham is prepared to obey, God stops him and promises his descendants a reward for his faith. In the second reading of St Paul's letter to the Romans he tells them that "With God on our side" we should have no fear. This passage is a kind of "Cheer" for the "victory over suffering" that God has gained by saving us by sacrificing His own Son on the cross. It is also meant to give heart to people worried about being thought unworthy of God's love. In Mark's Gospel Jesus, accompanied by Peter, James and John underwent a miraculous transformation on the secluded Mount Tabor. Appearing with Moses an Elijah, significant figures in the history of Israel, links Jesus with the promise of a Messiah so giving confidence to his apostles that He is the Messiah and they should be strong in following Him... These readings invite us to reflect on our journey of faith and have a trust in God's love, even amidst trials and sufferings.

6pm: Confessions 6.30pm Vigil Mass Mark Herbich RIP	Saturday 24th St King Ethelbert of Kent Born 550 as a pagan. Married to Christian daughter of the King of the Franks in France, Bertha. As King of Kent was the first Anglo-Saxon king to be converted to Christianity by St Augustine and his missionary monks who he then supported. Made sure Christianity was not forced on his subjects as was requested by Pope Gregory. He restored and built churches. Founded St Pauls in London. Created fair and just laws in his kingdom.						
9.30 am Mass	Sunday 25 th February Second Sunday of Lent						
6.30 pm Mass	Monday 26th St Paula Montal Fornés Born in 1799 at the seaside town of Areyns de Mar near Barcelona in Spain, the eldest of five girls. Brought up by her parents as a devout Christian with a special devotion to Our Lady. Her father died when she was 10. Worked as a lace maker and seamstress to support the family. Also helped to care for her sisters and other children in the parish when she was older. Realised the lack of opportunity for girls to receive an education so opened schools to give secular, spiritual & vocational education. Founded teaching Order of nuns.						
10 am Mass Noemia de Melo RIP	Tuesday 27th St Anne Line Born 1665. Father was a rich Calvinist and Protestant reformer. Anne and her brother became Catholics and were then disowned. Married Roger Line from the New Forest, also a convert. Husband arrested and banished from England. After 10 years he died in Flanders in 1594. Anne was asked by Jesuit priest Fr John Gerard to look after a "safe house" in London. She had to continually move to new premises. Eventually arrested, found guilty of hiding priests and organising Masses. Executed in 1601. One of the 40 Martyrs of England and Wales.						
6.30 pm Mass	Wednesday 28th St Romanus and St Lupicinus . 2 brothers who founded two monasteries in the forests of the Jura Mountains between France and Switzerland. The brothers acted as joint abbots who imposed very austere conditions for the monks who spent much of their time in very hard labour. They never touched meat, only used milk and eggs when they were ill. They wore wooden shoes and skins of animals sewn together that was not much protection in winter. Romanus died 28 th February 460 and his brother Lupicinus, more austere of the two, almost 20 years later.						
10 am Mass	Thursday 29th St Oswald of Worcester Born in about 925 in England of Danish parents. Educated by his uncle Odo, later Archbishop of Canterbury, and a Frankish tutor. Oswald became Dean of the secular canons of Winchester. Then a Benedictine monk at Fleury-sur-Loire, France. Returned to England where Archbishop Odo was dying. Helped Danish relative Archbishop Oskytel of York. Appointed Bishop of Worcester. Founded monasteries. Invited Continental scholars to teach in them. Church reformer. Made Archbishop of York but also stayed as Bishop of Worcester by permission of the pope. The wealth of the Worcester diocese helped the much poorer diocese of \York much to the gratitude of King of Northumberland. Died on 29 th February, Leap Year Day, 992 during Maundy Thursday feet washing ceremony in Worcester. Buried in Worcester Cathedral.						

NO MASS	had been raped and teacher. Fo in Pembrokeshi herbs and vege	Friday 1st March St David of Wales Born in about 500 during a storm, her mother a nun who had been raped by a Prince. Was educated at a monastery by Abbot St Paulinus A great preacher and teacher. Founded twelve monasteries including Glastonbury Abbey, Caldey Island and Mynyw in Pembrokeshire where he stayed. Led an austere life style. Only drank water and ate only bread, herbs and vegetables. Strict regime of religious activities and hard work in the fields, crafts and beekeeping. Bishop of Menevia in South Wales. Shrine was a place of pilgrimage.							
 Saturday 2nd St Chad Born about 634 in Northumbria, the youngest of 4 brothers St Cedd, S Cynibil and Caelin who all became priests, two of them bishops. Taught by famous Bishop Aidan a Lindisfarne. Monk in Ireland. Appointed Abbot of Lastingham by his brother Bishop Cedd. Appointed Bishop of York by King Oswy to replace St Wilfred who was absent for years in France. Returned to Lastingham when St Wilfred returned. Then Archbishop Theodore of Canterbury made him Bishop 									
Peter RIP	of Mercia. Made	of Mercia. Made his centre Lichfield and converted many in the Midlands of England away from paganism including King Wulfere and his Queen. First Bishop of Lichfield. Died 2 nd March 672.

Reaching the Unreached was set up in Tamil Nadu in south east India in 1978 by De La Salle Brother James Kimpton. There are now 4 Children's Villages, 10 Hostels so that around 1,000 children are in care. There are 8 Nursery Schools, 3 Primary Schools and a Secondary School for children of the most disadvantaged families locally. Other ventures include house building, nearly 9,000 built ; bore well drilling, around 2,500 wells; Self Help Groups to empower rural women; affordable loans to start small businesses or borrow money for emergencies such as medical care to avoid high interest rates of money lender
