Page 158 Exodus 20: 1-17 1 Corinthians 1: 22-25 John 2: 13-25 In the first reading from Exodus, God gave the Ten Commandments to Moses. The Law was given to Israel to help them become wiser. It was given to them in order to strengthen their relationship with God and help them organise their social and religious life. Hence the commandments of God are meant to form a sacred community. That is, a community rooted in the genuine worship of God. A community that lives in justice and peace with real respect and love for each other. The second reading to the Corinthians in Greece states that "Christ is the power and wisdom of God". Greeks were always searching for wisdom. The Greek word for wisdom is "sophia" and the word philosophy means "love of wisdom". But Paul explains what seems a paradox. "God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength". We sometimes fall into the trap of thinking we have to prove that we are powerful and wise in the eyes of others. Real moral strength and wisdom can often appear weak and foolish in a materialistic world. In John's Gospel, Jesus is very angry that the Temple should be a sacred place reserved for prayer and worship. At that time worship at the Temple in Jerusalem included animal sacrifice. Jews at Passover travelling from afar could not bring animals with them. They also had to exchange Roman coins for the Temple coins that were needed to pay the Temple tax. So, this animal market and the moneychangers were driven out of the Temple by Jesus. How often do we turn a "blind eye" to something that is wrong or unjust? When vulnerable people are abused or ill-treated; when racist language is used; when the disabled are mocked. We must not remain silent or indifferent but stand up for the principles of Christ.

6pm: Confessions 6.30pm Vigil Mass Peter RIP	Saturday 2nd St Chad Born about 634 in Northumbria, the youngest of 4 brothers St Cedd, St Cynibil and Caelin who all became priests, two of them bishops. Taught by famous Bishop Aidan at Lindisfarne. Monk in Ireland. Appointed Abbot of Lastingham by his brother Bishop Cedd. Appointed Bishop of York by King Oswy to replace St Wilfred who was absent for years in France. Returned to Lastingham when St Wilfred returned. Then Archbishop Theodore of Canterbury made him Bishop of Mercia. Made his centre Lichfield and converted many in the Midlands of England away from paganism including King Wulfere and his Queen. First Bishop of Lichfield. Died 2 nd March 672.					
9.30 am Mass	Sunday 3 rd March Third Sunday of Lent					
6.30 pm Mass	Monday 4th St Casimar of Poland Born in 1458 at Wawel Castle, Kraków, Poland second son of King Casimir IV of Poland. Prince Was brought up by his loving mother and a priest. Prayerful youth who helped the poor. Involved in a war and had to lead an army aged only 13. Made peace much to the annoyance of his father. Vowed never to take up arms again. Pleaded with his father to act more justly. Gave his wealth to the poor. Refused marriage. Austere and holy life. Died aged 29.					
10 am Mass	Tuesday 5th St Piran Born 420 in Ireland. Became a monk and founded a monastery in County Offaly. His austere beliefs upset some monks. They tied him to a mill-stone and rolled him over a cliff into stormy water. Water calmed and he landed in Cornwall at Perranzabuloe, near present day Perranporth. Known in Ireland as Ciarán of Saighir but in Cornwall as Piran. Lived as a hermit. First disciples a badger, a fox and a bear. His sanctity and austerity won him veneration. Joined by many Christian converts. Rediscovered tin smelting which had been started in Roman times. St Piran's flag, a white cross on a black background, represents tin smelting rising to the top from the black tin bearing ore. Founded Abbey of Lanpiran as abbot. He died in 480 and was buried at Perranzabuloe. St Piran's Cross is in the Perranporth sand dunes there. Patron saint of tin miners.					
SVP Social 1 pm \to 3 pm 6.30 pm Mass	Wednesday 6th St Colette of Corbie Born 1381 in France. Carpenter's daughter. Orphaned aged17. Tried being a lay religious in 2 Orders. Then a Franciscan hermit aged 21 for 4 years. Had visions of St Francis of Assisi to make the <i>Poor Clares</i> observe stricter rules of austerity. Antipope Benedict XIII gave her powers to reform the <i>Poor Clares</i> . She met a lot of opposition. Eventually started new convents with rule of absolute poverty and went barefoot. Rules of fasting and abstinence. 18 convents in her lifetime with her nuns that were known as <i>Colettine Sisters</i> .					
10 am Mass	Thursday 7th St Perpetua and St Felicity Perpetua had a young baby. Felicity was a pregnant slave girl. With others they were arrested in Carthage, North Africa for wanting to be Christians in 203. Baptised in prison. Tried and condemned to be thrown to the wild beasts in the Coliseum in Carthage. Both died by the sword as martyrs with their companions					

NO MASS	Was a shepher in Europe for 1 Islamic Moors. Had visions of refuge for prost	Friday 8th St John of God Born 1495 in Portugal. Left home. Travelled with a priest to Spain. Was a shepherd. Joined Spanish army to fight the French. Then fought the Islamic Ottoman Turks in Europe for 18years. Distinguished military career. Went to Africa to release Christians from the Islamic Moors. Returned to Spain. Met John of Ávila who encouraged him to work with the poor. Had visions of infant Jesus and Virgin Mary. Opened a hospital, night shelter for homeless and a refuge for prostitutes. Founded an Order of Brother Hospitallers of St John of God.							
Saturday 9th St Francis of Rome Born 1384 in Rome to wealthy parents. Wanted to be a nun. Arranged marriage at age 13 to noble soldier and socialite. Initially unhappy but settled down to

Charity chosen by Fr Michael and Fr Thomas to support during Lent. Reaching the Unreached

Reaching the Unreached was set up in Tamil Nadu in south east India in 1978 by De La Salle Brother James Kimpton. There are now 4 Children's Villages, 10 Hostels so that around 1,000 children are in care. There are 8 Nursery Schools, 3 Primary Schools and a Secondary School for children of the most disadvantaged families locally. Other ventures include house building, nearly 9,000 built ; bore well drilling, around 2,500 wells; Self Help Groups to empower rural women; affordable loans to start small businesses or borrow money for emergencies such as medical care to avoid high interest rates of money lender
