Page 182 Isaiah 50: 4-7 Philippians 2: 6-11 Mark 14: 1 to 15: 47

This Sunday, also called Passion Sunday, is the first day of Holy Week, the final week of Lent, and tells of the final days of Jesus, culminating in the crucifixion and resurrection on Easter Sunday. This weekend's Masses are Holy Week in miniature.

The first reading from Isaiah uses wonderful words to describe the life of a disciple who wakes each morning to listen to God and shows the obedience of a disciple and servant of God who, despite suffering and humiliation, remains steadfast and trusts in God's plan.

The second reading from St Paul's letter to the Philippians is a great canticle, which appears in the *Liturgy of the Hours*, and is one of the oldest hymns of the Christian community. It probably predates Paul himself, a song known and loved by the Philippian Church. Paul added the line "death on a cross" to the poem. It tells of Christ's humility and obedience that leads to His ultimate glorification with God. The first Gospel tells of the triumphant entrance of Jesus into Jerusalem. Riding on a borrowed colt, Jesus was hailed by the crowds as they blessed God and shouted "Hosanna". This event is reported in each of the four Gospels. The main Gospel from Mark relates Jesus' passion and death presented as the consequence of the tension between the Jewish authorities and Jesus that had been building throughout his public ministry. This tension reached its breaking point when Jesus drove merchants and moneychangers from the Temple. After this event the chief priests and scribes began seeking a way to put Jesus to death. Mark tells the story as a sequence of swiftly changing scenes and sets in dramatic contrast the actions and the motives of the chief players; the priests and scribes; the betrayal of Judas; Peter challenged by a servant girl; Pilate with all the power of Rome, but yielding against his better judgment in the face of pressure from the mob. During the week we should prayerfully remember the events of the passion and death of Jesus, the most ignominious death known to the ancient world, and immerse ourselves in the drama of Holy Week. As followers of Jesus we are invited to embrace humility, endure suffering and remain faithful to God's will, inspired by the example of Jesus. Malcolm.

High reputation as a lawyer. King Philip of Spain made him Grand Inquisitor. Ordained a priest in 1578. Made Archbishop of Lima in Peru. Stood up for the indigenous Indians against their Spanish masters. Reformed the clergy to learn Indian languages. Produced catechisms in Quechuan, Aymara and Spanish. Visited all parts of his diocese, staying with local communities. He baptised and Confirmed almost half million converts including 4 future saints, the most famous St Martin de Porres and St Rose of Lima. Started 1 <sup>st</sup> seminary in Western Hemisphere

6.30 pm Mass	Monday 25 <sup>th</sup> St Margaret Clitherow Born in 1553 in York to Protestant parents. Married Protestant butcher in the Shambles Became a Catholic 3 years later. Refused to attend Protestant services and her husband paid fines. Imprisoned 3 times. Learnt to read and had a child in prison. Hid priests in their home. Opened school to teach the Catholic faith. Hired house for celebration of Mass. Lodged priests, in heavy disguise, in Black Swan Inn where priest catchers stayed. Sent stepson to English College to train as a priest. Husband arrested to explain. House searched and priest hole and hidden room for Mass found. Margaret arrested and tortured. She refused to plea. Martyred while pregnant with her third child. Crushed by the door from her house being loaded with heavy weights. Her stepson and son became priests, and her daughter became a nun.							
10 am Mass	<b>Tuesday 26<sup>th</sup> St Ludger Münster</b> Born in 742 to wealthy Christian Frisians near Utrecht in Netherlands. When young met St Boniface. Educated at Utrecht Cathedral School. Sent by Abbot Gregory to York. Studied under scholar Alcuin. Then ordained a deacon. Returned to Utrecht Cathedral School and wrote biography of Abbot Gregory. Ordained a priest in Cologne. Sent to rebuild churches and evangelise in Fresia. Driven out by Saxon war leader. Went to Rome. Stayed at Monte Cassino for 2 years. Emperor Charlemagne recaptured Fresia. Ludger returned to restore Christianity. Built monasteries and churches. Cured blind singer and poet Bernlef and then converted him. Appointed the Bishop of Műnster. Reformed the diocese and the clergy.							
Reconciliation Service 5.30 pm	Holy Wednesday 27 <sup>th</sup> St John of Egypt. Born 305 in Egypt. His parents were poor. He trained as a carpenter. Aged 25 became a monk under the guidance of an elderly hermit for ten years. When the old man died he visited various monasteries for five years in Egypt but did not like living in a community. Aged 40 he returned to living as a hermit walled into a collection of three cells. For 5 days of the week he prayed and received no visitors. At weekends people brought him food and water and he preached to the crowds that gathered. He only gave personal advice to men,							

avoiding seeing women to avoid temptation. He only ate after sunset, a diet of vegetables and dried

fruit. Gained a reputation for prophesy. Visited by St Palladius, first Bishop of Ireland. Died aged 90.

Reaching the Unreached was set up in Tamil Nadu in south east India in 1978 by De La Salle Brother James Kimpton. There are now 4 Children's Villages, 10 Hostels so that around 1,000 children are in care. There are 8 Nursery Schools, 3 Primary Schools and a Secondary School for children of the most disadvantaged families locally. Other ventures include house building, nearly 9,000 built; bore well drilling, around 2,500 wells; Self Help Groups to empower rural women; affordable loans to start small businesses or borrow money for emergencies such as medical care to avoid high interest rates of money lender
