Page 261 or 265 Acts of the Apostles 4: 8-12 1 John 3: 1-2 Gospel: John 10: 11-18 This weekend the Church celebrates Christ, the Good Shepherd. He accepted suffering and death to save His flock, Christ, the Good Shepherd, is our role model of love and care. If we obediently continue to listen to Him, He will lead us safely to our destination with Him and the Father in heaven.

The first reading emphasises the central role of the apostles and the Holy Spirit at Pentecost after the Ascension of Jesus. The apostles Peter and John had healed a crippled man at the gates of the Temple and preached to the people in Jerusalem about Jesus. While they were addressing the crowd, the Jewish leaders came and arrested them for preaching that Jesus had risen from the dead. The reading this weekend is Peter's speech at their trial. His message was focused on the identity of Jesus, explaining that it was by the power of Jesus that the crippled man was healed and saved. Despite being rejected by the Jewish leaders, Jesus is the cornerstone of the New Temple of the people of God which is the Christian Church. As Peter said, "There is no salvation through anyone else". Central to our faith is this message: God sent Jesus to save us from sin and He is the only means by which we can be saved and can seek salvation in Him.

In the second reading from John we hear that salvation offered to us out of love results in us becoming children of God. By grace God adopts us and makes us true inheritors of His kingdom. Salvation through Christ takes us from being ostracised from God as a result of sin to being part of His family. Yet being *children of God* often ostracises us from the world around us. Jesus was also ostracises and even crucified by the world. The goal of the Christian life is to be like Christ and, therefore, we should expect to be treated like Christ was. But that is not the end of the story. As *children of God* we will inherit the kingdom of God in heaven and see God face to face in perfect unending communion. That is what we have to look forward to if we remain faithful to Him.

In John's Gospel, in identifying Himself as *The Good Shepherd*, Jesus alluded to the Old Testament understanding of God as the shepherd of His people, Israel. God at times appointed leaders to shepherd His people on His behalf like Joshua and King David. However, the intention was always that God would Himself shepherd His people. Here Jesus, as God in the flesh, reveals how this will come about. Jesus is the "one shepherd" to look after the "one flock", which is the Church. He knows His sheep intimately and they know Him. As a good shepherd, He will not abandon His flock. Rather, Jesus is willing to die to protect His sheep. In fact, Jesus did die on the cross for His flock. He laid down His life so that we, His sheep, might be able to live. But even in death Jesus did not abandon us. He is still with us as our *Good Shepherd*, leading us to where we need to be. Therefore, let us follow our *Good Shepherd* where He leads us.
