Sixth Sunday of Easter

Sunday 5th May 2024

Thursday 9th May is the feast of the Ascension of the Lord and Holy Day of Obligation

Acts of the Apostles 10: 25-26, 34-35. 44-48 Page 264 or 268 1 John 4: 7-10 Gospel John 15: 9-17 The first reading from the Acts of the Apostles features Cornelius, the first Gentile, or non-Jew, recorded in the New Testament to become a follower and believer in Jesus and received the gift of the Holy Spirit. Cornelius was a Roman centurion, an officer in the Roman army, who had become convinced that Jesus had a message that was true and appealed to him and his family. He had a vision of an angel who told him to call for the apostle Peter. In the Jews salvation history, the Old Testament laws had ensured that the Jewish people of Israel remained separate from their pagan Gentile foreign neighbours and the Israelites alone were included in the Covenant with God. Now Peter accepts that anybody of any nationality who believes in Jesus and fears God should be baptised as Jesus Himself had talked about as a New Covenant that replaced the Old Covenant with the Jews. Peter's Jewish friends are amazed when the Holy Spirit enables people from all nationalities to understand his preaching. In the second reading from John, he emphasises that love originates from God. We need to know the meaning of "love" in this context. This "love" goes way beyond a fleeting feeling that we have when we say "I love an ice cream". The "love" John is referring to is a true love which must be rational and a real relationship. Ice cream might make us feel good for a time but we can never enter into a relationship with ice cream. God's love leads to a self-giving action and we see the supreme example of this true love in Jesus when the Father sent His only Son to die on the cross for our sins. God is the essence of love itself, and loving others is how we truly know God. This love is not just a human emotion but a reflection of the divine presence within us. This weekend's Gospel reading from John records some of the last words of Jesus before His crucifixion. Jesus first refers to how the Father loved Him and how He passed on this love to everyone who kept His commandments just as He obeyed His Father and remained in His love. His primary message is the same as we heard in the second reading. We have already seen that this love is self-giving and active. Jesus now says we must "love one another" which is giving us a high calling which is not always easy to achieve. He also emphasises that the ultimate expression of love is sacrificing one's life for friends. With regards to friendship with God, He elevates his followers from servants to friends, and Jesus shares divine truth with them. This shift illustrates the deep personal relationship God seeks with us, based on transparency and mutual love. This love must be steadfast, unchanging, patient, sympathetic, considerate, gentle kind, not jealous, not arrogant, not selfish and should seek to serve rather than being served, always ready to give rather than to receive and work for the good of all in society. Founded a monastery at Beverley near Hull in Yorkshire. He died on 7 th May 721 and was buried there. Tomb became a place of pilgrimage. King Athelstan of the Anglo-Saxons prayed for victory in a battle in 937. King Edward I was a devotee and built a chantry in Beverley Minster in 1295 and later a shrine. In 1415 King Henry V won the Battle of Agincourt after praying to St John.

Elected Pope in 608 after 2 short term papacies. Problems of famine, plague, wars and natural disasters. Converted Roman Pantheon into Christian Church. Hosted Church Council to restore monastic discipline attended by Bishop of London. He still lived as a Benedictine monk and converted his home in Rome into a monastery. Died in 615 aged 65
