Page 95 Ezekiel 17: 22-24 2 Corinthians 5: 6-10 Gospel: Mark 4: 26-34

The first reading from the prophet Ezekiel is written at the time the Israelites where in captivity in Babylon. In exile Ezekiel is devastated that Jehoiachin, the last king in David's dynasty, was defeated, taken prisoner and deported with his people to Babylon. He describes the national disaster with an image of David's family as a luxuriant cedar tree that a brutal and ruthless woodcutter, Nebuchadnezzar, King of Babylon, cut down. However, God has not deserted them as he has taken from the highest branch of the cedar tree, a cutting that will be planted on a high mountain in Israel so it will shoot, sprout branches, bear fruit and become another noble cedar tree. He prophesise that the Israelites will eventually be free again in their homeland. There is also a message that God exalts the humble and bring low the proud – "stunts tall trees and makes the low ones grow". In the second reading of Paul's letter to the Corinthians in Greece, Paul is now advanced in years and seems to beginning to feel tired. The sufferings he had endured, the persecutions, the betrayals of friends, the misunderstanding of so many fellow Christians had marked him in body and spirit. He compares his condition to that of an exile in the world and feels like a stranger whose thoughts keep turning to a homeland that awaits him in heaven. He realises that this desire to leave the world could be understood as an escape from difficulties, sufferings and responsibilities of Christian communities born from his preaching. He concludes: As long as the Lord wants to leave me in this body, I will give of my best to please the Lord.

The Gospel of Mark, written by John Mark, is known for its fast paced narrative and focus on the actions and miracles of Jesus. In the first parable a man sows seed by making broad gestures as he joyfully and unsparingly scatters the precious wheat grains everywhere to grow on its own. This is how the Gospel message must be spread in profusion to everyone and develops with the help of the Holy Spirit. The second parable focuses on the tiny mustard seed. Small as it is, it develops into a tree with a wide expanse that provides a nesting place for birds just as God's kingdom is open and welcomes everyone. In the readings from Ezekiel and Mark very small things can produce and achieve really big results. We must trust in God that our small efforts can turn into something wonderful like Mother Teresa and Pope John Paul II who achieved great things from humble starts.
