Modern Slavery



Jenny LeLean from Caritas Portsmouth draws our attention to Anti-Slavery week, runs from **14-20 October**...

There are around 50 million people trapped in slavery around the world and 122,000 in the UK so this is something that is found in all our communities. Pope Francis urged us to walk in the footsteps of St Bakhita who was sold as a child into slavery and was a victim of traffickers until she landed in Italy, where she later became a Cannosian religious sister. "Saint Bakhita encourages us to open our eyes and ears to see those who go unseen and to hear those who have no voice, to acknowledge the dignity of each

person, and to fight trafficking and all forms of exploitation."

All Catholic Churches in England and Wales are changing to the new translation of the Lectionary – the Book used for all Scripture Readings at Mass.

WHEN? The change will take place from the First Sunday of Advent (1st December 2024).

WHY? To make the text more faithful to the original language and easier to proclaim.

HOW? We are arranging sessions for **new and all existing** Readers to see it and try it out. For convenience, the sessions have been arranged spread over different weekday evenings and at weekends in the coming months to allow all Readers to attend. It is necessary for **all Readers at Sunday Mass** to attend before 1 December. Dates/Times available:



When a person is due to go into hospital, please also let your parish priest know so that he can administer the Sacrament of the Sick where appropriate.

A Note from Mr Quinn

Dear Parishioners,

For both secondary and primary schools, this term is populated by open mornings and evenings. These events are not unique to Catholic schools. A school open event can never be a true reflection of an average school day; after all, having hundreds of visitors walking around the school site is not normal. But the event will give families a flavour of what goes on, allow them to soak up the atmosphere, hear the Headteacher speak, meet pupils and teachers, and look beyond what the website shows.

During these events, assessing pastoral care is often at the top of the agenda for parents and carers. The word 'pastoral' has rich agrarian roots, derived from the Latin 'pastor', meaning 'shepherd'. Pastoral care is not just the preserve of Catholic schools; other schools share common features which might also be referred to as welfare.

What sets our schools apart is the ability to offer something very distinctive that not only incorporates a broad definition of wellbeing and welfare, it is also linked to beliefs, values, attitudes, knowledge, skills, gifts and talents.

'Pastoral Care' can be traced back to Jesus giving the New Commandment: 'Just as I have loved you, you should also love one another'. This includes the decisions, structures and practices taken to challenge, nurture and support students whilst maintaining the dignity of each one, honouring richness and diversity as each person 'is created in the image and likeness of God' (Catechism of the Catholic Church, para.1701). It is this that makes the pastoral offer in our Catholic schools unique.




Iceland Escapades

Forty Oaklands students from Years 10 and 11, accompanied by five members of staff, visited Iceland in July.

An early start at school on Wednesday 17th July, enabled us to reach Iceland by mid-afternoon, where the students visited sites associated with the rifting tectonic plates. At Gunnuhver, we were able to experience a geothermal area where the immense heat generated by the magma at relatively shallow depths is harnessed to generate electricity and provide hot water. This was also the case at the Blue Lagoon, where we enjoyed bathing in the 37°C water - discharge from the nearby power station. The changes to the landscape since 2023 were remarkable. The recent eruptions in the area have resulted in lava flows moving inexorably towards the Blue Lagoon; the determination of the authorities to defend it at all costs was clear to see, with huge embankments built to divert any future potential lava flows.

Our first full day was spent journeying around the 'Golden Circle'. We visited the Kerid volcano - a circular depression formed by an eruption 5,000 years ago. The rifting theme from the first day was explored once more as we visited Thingvellir, where the divergence of the North American and Eurasian plates is most spectacular. The heat, which is the cause of the rifting, was evident as we watched the Strokkur geyser erupt at Geysir. We had our lunch there and sat watching the eruptions every five minutes or so. A short drive from there was Gulfoss: a two-stage waterfall cascading some 40 metres into a steep gorge carved out by the River Olfusa as the waterfall retreated. The Faxifoss waterfall, often called Iceland's Niagara, was the final waterfall we visited. A significant number of the students on the trip had been selected for end-of-year Governor subject awards, and the recipients of both the Helen Shipman and Heads of Year Awards on the trip, so, we had an award ceremony at the Ljosfoss HEP education centre, and the main event took place concurrently back at Oaklands.



On Friday, we visited the Eldfell volcano on the island of Heimaey, which erupted in 1973. It marked one of the few occasions when people actively combatted a volcanic eruption by attempting to divert the lava that was flowing towards the town and harbour. Following a forty-minute ferry journey, we arrived at the port and commenced our trek to the summit of the volcano, where the residual heat from the eruption was still present. In the afternoon, we enjoyed a coach trip around the islands where we visited historical sites, puffin colonies and dramatic coastal scenery. Before returning to the mainland, we spent an hour at the swimming pool on the island. Our final stop was at the Gluggafoss waterfall which was just a few minutes from our accommodation.

On Saturday, we travelled along the south coast towards Vik – the most southerly point of Iceland. This coastline on the route is characterised by towering cliffs, waterfalls and vast expanses of outwash plain, which emanate from the Eyjafjallajokull (the volcano that was responsible for flight disruption in 2010) and the Myrdalsjokull ice sheets. Seljalandsfoss waterfall was our first stop, where students were able to walk behind the curtain of water which cascades from a forty-metre-high cliff. Although very attractive, Seljalandsfoss is perhaps surpassed by Skogafoss just to the east, which we visited later in the day.



The coastal cliffs were at their most impressive near Vik. At Reynisfjara beach, the low tide allowed us to view the basalt columns. Just to the west was Dyrholeay – a huge coastal arch – which we were able to see from a neighbouring promontory.

The waterfalls are fed by melt water from the glaciers that we got tantalising glimpses of as we travelled along the coast. Fortunately, the Solheimajokull glacier is an 'outlet' glacier, which descends from the Myrdalsjokull ice sheet towards the coastal plain. We had organised a guided tour of this and after being kitted out with crampons, helmets, harnesses and ice axes, we found ourselves ascending the glacier. This was the highlight of the trip for many of our students and staff.

Our final day in Iceland, on Sunday the 21st of July was spent in the capital, Reykjavik. While there, we visited the concert hall, City Hall, the famous Hallgrimskirkja church and we walked through the main shopping area and harbour. We returned home to Oaklands late that evening.

Such a trip can't be a success without the support of my colleagues. I would like to thank Mrs Broadway, Mrs Over, Mrs Rucinska and Mr Horn for all of their efforts. Moreover, I would like to extend my thanks to the students, as they were a pleasure to spend time with. Hopefully, they will remember the content when learning about hazards this term!



News from St Paul's Sophie's Legacy



Sophie's Legacy was created in memorial of Sophie Fairall and the legacy of change she wanted to create.

Sophie had just turned 9 when she was diagnosed with a rare form of childhood cancer called Rhabdomyosarcoma in September 2020. During her treatment, she endured nine rounds of intense chemotherapy and seven weeks of radiotherapy.

Sophie never managed to get into remission and in June 2021, after only eight weeks on a programme of maintenance chemotherapy, she relapsed. With no treatment options left Sophie passed away aged 10, in September 2021, just one year after her diagnosis.

Sophie wanted the following things changed and this will be her legacy in memory of a remarkable young girl who touched so many lives.

- 1. Play specialist 7 days a week in hospitals
- 2. Improvements to food for children in hospital
- 3. For parents to be fed when staying with their child
- 4. For GP's, nurses and health professionals to be trained in childhood cancer
- 5. To increase the funds (currently 3%) in childhood cancer research

Exploring Portsmouth

On a recent school trip to Portsmouth, the children in Year 4 enjoyed a truly memorable day investigating how land is used in the different areas of Portsmouth and to enhance our understanding of whether Portsmouth is a gateway to the world.

We travelled to Portsmouth Harbour by train, and upon arrival at Havant Station, the excitement grew as we eagerly awaited our train's arrival. The journey was swift, and soon after disembarking at Portsmouth Harbour Station, we gathered to discuss how land is utilised in this area. The pupils found evidence of various transport links, including the Gosport and Isle of Wight ferries, as well as further travel with available train services leading to London. After our discussion, we walked through to Gunwharf Quays, where we discovered and followed the Millennium chain. The pupils marvelled at the iconic Spinnaker Tower as we made our way towards Old Portsmouth. Continuing our journey, we passed the historic Hot Walls and took time to explore Portsmouth Cathedral before reaching the Garrison Church, noted for its missing roof. During our visit, we discussed Portsmouth's significance as a maritime city and searched for clues related to the city's maritime history this helped us to appreciate its rich heritage.

As we walked, we also practiced compass skills using landmarks such as the Spinnaker Tower. We particularly enjoyed this, and were able to spot other compasses along the way, such as the weather vane on the Cathedral and a compass plaque embedded in the ground near the Hot Walls.

After a wonderful morning, we conducted a survey to discover why people visit Gunwharf. This fieldwork activity provided valuable insights into the area's usage and enabled us to connect our learning to real-world observations.

Finally, we made our way back to Portsmouth Harbour train station to catch our return train to Havant. Despite the grey skies and occasional light showers, our enthusiasm remained high, and we enjoyed the opportunity to explore Portsmouth and the surrounding area.

Overall, the trip was a fantastic educational experience, effectively blending exploration, practical skills, and insightful discussions about Portsmouth land use, how it connects to the world and the maritime history which was evident throughout.

Students Lead the

Way at Climate

Change Conference

At St Peter's, part of the school's EARA (equality and rights advocates) group took part in a Climate Unity Conference with other schools in Hampshire. The conference was part of Hampshire's Climate Unity Project, raising children's awareness of global issues effecting the environment.

During the conference, the children discussed different environmental issues brought to them by Hampshire Wildlife Trust. They worked as a group to identify




solutions to each issue and it was interesting to see the range of different solutions suggested by each school.

Next, they were introduced to the David Shepherd Wildlife Foundation, who ran a workshop on elephants. The children worked together using waste materials to create an enclosure to keep these animals from eating crops. Ideas the children encompassed in their models included: loud noises, fences, alternative food sources and other things to scare off the elephants.

Finally, the children had the exciting opportunity to use a programme called Lyfta, where they were able to zone in on an area of Cornwall and a man carrying what looked like an Easter Island statue! After discussing their initial thoughts on what they saw, they then watched a video where the man was seen beachcombing and using what he found to make sculptures and artwork.

The conference generated lots of food for thought of how we can protect the environment locally and globally and the children look forward to actioning some of their ideas in the future.

Agents of Change

At St Thomas More's, one of our school House Patrons is St Oscar Romero. He spoke up for those who are oppressed and called us to be a voice for the voiceless. This guides much of what we do at school.

In the past, pupils have helped the vulnerable in many different ways, but this year we have begun our year of Faith in Action. Each class will decide what they are going to do to be a voice for the voiceless and put their faith into action. Our work started in September with Columba class who chose to work with the charity Kids Clothesline, who provide 'a wardrobe in a bag' for families who are struggling financially. We like the children to do more than just collect items or raise money for charities; we like them to work alongside the volunteers to be stewards of their time as well, giving up their time to help those in need.

October is Mars Class's turn, and they are organising the collections for our Harvest Liturgy where we split the produce between the One Church Food Bank, a group who not only distribute food to those in need but also offer to pray with them, and 2Saints - a charity supporting the socially excluded such as those who have recently been released from prison. We have supported this charity for many years now as we believe it promotes Human Dignity, forgiveness, and the call to help some of the most forgotten in our local community. Alongside this work, we also have our Agents of Change, a small group of pupils who have a special focus on living out the principles of Catholic Social Teaching. Their first project this year is linked to 'care for our common home', and they will be working to set up a refill shop to encourage parents to live more sustainably.
